


#### Q2 What age range do you represent?





#### Q3 What are the ages of others in your household?



### Q4 In the summer, which method of transportation do you/will you use the most often to get to the MAIN STREET LIBRARY?





### Q5 In the winter, which method of transportation do you/will you use the most often to get to the MAIN STREET LIBRARY?





### Q6 In the summer, which method of transportation will you use the most often to get to the potential MIXED-USE COMMUNITY FACILITY?















## Q13 What kinds of activities would you prefer to do with your age peers only at the potential MIXED-USE COMMUNITY FACILITY?




# Q15 What kinds of personal or health services would you like to be able to access through the potential MIXED-USE COMMUNITY FACILITY? (Choose all that apply)

# Q16 What times of day and days of the week are you most likely to visit the potential MIXED-USE COMMUNITY FACILITY? (Choose all that apply)



### Q17 What other services would you like to see at the potential MIXED-USE COMMUNITY FACILITY?




## Q19 Are you interested in participating in volunteer opportunities at the potential MIXED-USE COMMUNITY FACILITY?







## Q24 What types of outdoor activities would you like to see accommodated on site at the MAIN STREET LIBRARY? Select two outdoor features that are important to include:




